Clyde Shields Distinguished Service Award named for first long-term dialysis patient

Although Mr. Shields' kidneys had failed – a death sentence before the innovation – the shunt and regular dialysis helped him survive another 11 years. His courage as a research subject made possible great advances in kidney treatment.
